This data was manually compiled from data in the WIA MIS as of 3/2/00 and is in the process of being verified. The calculation formula and related policy issues are also under review. In compiling "goals due" for the above table the following was taken into account: goals attained late; goals due and not obtained; goals of exiters not due and not obtained; youth in younger youth funded activities with no goals set; basic skills deficient youth in younger youth funded activities with no basic skills goal set.

The WIA core measure for the Younger Youth Skill Attainment Rate is required by Section 136 of the Act and the measure is defined in TEGL 7-99. The TEGL requires that at least 1 and no more than 3 goals be set for each younger youth each of his/her participation. The TEGL also requires that all youth deficient in basic literacy skills have a basic skills goal. Therefore, it has been the position of the State that the basic skills goal requirement be taken in account in computing outcomes for this measure. However, the calculation formula has omitted this element in the past resulting in considerable confusion. 944 of the goals due on the above table represent basic skills deficient younger youth who should have had a basic skills goals due during the report period but for whom none was recorded. AWI will be sending out to the regions the SSNs of these youth for review. And a policy clarification will be issued on this and other related issues by the state board.

SHORT-TERM MEASURE RELATED TO WIA ADULT EMPLOYED WORKERS

At the April meetings of the Workforce Florida (WFI) Finance Committee and Executive Committee new incentive policy was approved for the WIA, TANF, and Wagner-Peyser Programs. This policy, as approved, includes provisions for a new WIA adult short-term measure to “to address the successful completion of training and continued employment for employed workers”. The two committees also recommended that once this measure is developed that it replace the WIA Overall Entered Employment Rate measure on the Red and Green report.

In taking this action it was the intent of the committees to complete the performance picture for WIA adults to clearly highlight employed workers. They also wished to focus on the emphasis of the WFI High Skills/High Wage Council on increased services for employed workers.

Attached are tables showing short-term outcome information for WIA adults. The tables cover the most recently completed 2000-2001 Program Year and third quarter information for the current program year, the period from July 1, 2001 through March 31, 2002. As the intent is to measure both “successful completion of training” as well as “continued employment”, the most closely related data on the attached tables would be that for percentage for exiters employed at registration that are employed and have obtained a credential at exit. This measure resembles in the short-term the long-term WIA core measure for adult employment and credential obtainment.

As a basis of comparison, we will also provide long-term adult employed worker employment and earnings information derived from FETPIP data.
